Two monitors are better than one

You can never have enough screen space, especially when organizing and working on your digital pictures. Instead of buying a larger monitor, if you're using Windows 7, Vista, or XP, you can buy an inexpensive second monitor and connect it to your computer—instantly doubling your desktop space.

Flat panel LCD monitors look great and will save room on your desk; CRT monitors also work well and can be less expensive.

There are several different ways you can make use of this extra screen space when working at home or in your office. If you take a lot of digital pictures, some of the advantages to having dual monitors at your work space include:

- When browsing your picture library, you can view the thumbnails on one monitor, and use the second monitor to view pictures full screen to check for proper focus and image quality.
- When editing photos, you can use one monitor to browse the pictures with Windows Explorer or a photo library program, and use the second monitor to edit the pictures with your photo-editing software.
- If you need to stay on top of your e-mail while working, you can keep your inbox open on one monitor and work on your photos on the other.

Set up two monitors on your desktop computer

Many new desktop computers support dual monitors without requiring any additional hardware. To see if you have more than one monitor connection, look at the back of your computer for two Video Graphics Array (VGA) connectors or two Digital Visual Interface (DVI) connectors or one of each.

Most new desktop computers include two connectors to support dual monitors

If you only have a single VGA or DVI connector, you will need to install a video adapter. You can either install a second video adapter or replace your current video adapter with one that has two VGA or DVI connections. Installing video adapters can be difficult if you're not familiar with the inside of your computer, so you may want to seek assistance from a local computer retailer that offers computer upgrade services.

Add a monitor to your laptop computer

If you have a laptop computer made in the last several years, you can almost certainly support an external monitor by connecting it to the VGA or DVI connector on the back of your computer. The external monitor can act as a second display to your laptop's built-in display. Connect your second monitor. You may have to restart your computer so that it detects the new monitor. After you connect your second monitor, you have to adjust your display settings.

Configuring your displays:

- For Windows 7
- For Windows Vista

• For Windows XP

Troubleshooting: If you do not see two monitor icons, your computer might not support multiple displays. First, make sure that you have Windows 7, Windows Vista, or Windows XP installed. Then, visit Microsoft Update, click Custom, and install any available hardware updates. You may also need to visit your computer manufacturer's Web site to install an updated display driver. If you still do not see two monitor icons, you may need to install an additional display adapter.

If necessary, drag the monitor icons so that they are arranged in the same way as the monitors on your desk. Click the Identify Monitors button to verify which monitor is 1 and which monitor is 2.

A dual monitor setup enables you to view the same image side by side.

Once your monitor is set up, you can use your mouse to grab the title bar of a window and drag it to your new display. If a window does not move when you drag it, double-click the title bar first, and then drag it. Having two monitors will forever change the way you work with your computer. Be creative and experiment with the sizing of application windows and what information you can keep in constant view while doing multiple tasks.

Monitor Display

The displayed page on my monitor is larger than my monitor screen, so I have to continually be scrolling right and left to see all of the words. What can I do to adjust the display to fit the monitor. Give this a try to reduce the overall size of your monitor's active screen.

- 1. Rightclick on the desktop and click Properties and then Settings.
- 2. Increase the resolution(number) a bit at a time until the screen just fits your monitor space....

Note: Be sure to write down the settings number as they were before you starting monkeying around with the resolutions. Larger numbers makes the screen smaller.

3. If you can't see to click the Apply button, just press Enter to make it change.

Astro Puzzle Game Saved

Save the game to finish later.

- 1. Click the button on the toolbar.
- 2. Type the game name.
- 4. Click the Save button.

When you start Astra Jigsaw next time, open the saved game just as you open a new jigsaw. You can also choose it in the list of the puzzles you played last. This list is at the bottom of the File menu. To open the menu, click the button.

By default, the program autosaves the current game every 10 minutes. To change this period, choose Options in the menu and open the Auto save tab. Then drag the Interval slider. To turn the autosaving off, uncheck Auto save game.

With the File > Save As command, you can save your game by a new name.

BYTES

A byte is pretty much like a character or letter in a word. The word sodium-free contains 11 bytes. (The hyphen counts as a byte.) Computer nerds picked up the metric system much more quickly than the rest of us, so bytes are measured in kilos (1,000), megas (1,000,000), and gigas (way huge).

A page of double-spaced text in Notepad is about 1,000 bytes, known as 1 kilobyte, which is often abbreviated as 1K. One thousand of those kilobytes is a megabyte, or 1MB. One thousand megabytes is a gigabyte, which brings us to your computer's sales slip: Most hard drives today are 2 gigabytes or larger.

* Just about all floppy disks these days can hold 1.44MB. Today's programs are huge, so they usually come on compact discs, which hold more than 600MB.

* All files are measured in bytes, regardless of whether they contain text. For example, that leafy forest background art some people put on their Windows 98 desktop takes up 66,146 bytes.

* A page of double-spaced text in Notepad takes up about 1K, but that same page in Microsoft Word consumes much more space. That's because Word sticks in lots more information: font size, the author's name, bookmarks, spell-check results, and just about anything else you can think of. * The Windows Explorer or My Computer programs can tell you how many bytes each of your files consumes. (Hint for anxious users: Click the file's name with your right mouse button and choose P[r]operties from the menu that pops up; you find more information about a file than you want to know.)

One kilobyte doesn't really equal 1,000 bytes. That would be too easy. Instead, this byte stuff is based on the number two. One kilobyte is really 1,024 bytes, which is 2 raised to the 10th power...but enough of that techie talk for now.

FOOTNOTES/ENDNOTES1[1]

You do a lot of word processing?

In WORD 97 documents there is an easy way to place footnotes(at the end of the page) or endnotes (at the end of the document). If you can press 3 keys at a time.

To insert a footnote- press CTRL-ALT-F. WORD will insert a footnote number at the cursor and then moves you to the bottom of the page where you type the footnote text.

To insert an endnote - press CTRL-ALT-E. Word inserts the endnote number at the cursor and moves you to the end of your document where you can type the endnote text.

To resume typing your document, simply click on the point where you want to resume.

well-funded private plan that covers their retirement needs.

they would find a very quick 'fix' to make the plan financially sound for their future.''
