Display Properties Tabs Missing in XP

Missing tabs seem to be a registry problem. I suggest that you create a new Restore Point before using, so if it doesn't work for you, you can do a System Restore and erase the changes made.

Question:

"I recently had a virus that among other things put it's own wallpaper on my desktop. I've been able to eradicate the virus, and even delete the

wallpaper file. However, I had to do that manually through Explorer. When I bring up the Display Properties window, either from right-clicking my desktop or from Control Panel > Display, I'm missing the Desktop and Screen Saver tabs. I would expect there's a place in the registry to turn these on/off - just can't seem to find where. Suggestions?"

Answer:

I found these two options in Google. I've never used either. But the first one http://www.kellys-korner-xp.com/xp_tweaks.htm # 128 was used by a Jmax Bits subscriber to whom I sent it and it did replace all the tabs on her Display Properties screen successfully.

Monitor Display

The displayed page on my monitor is larger than my monitor screen, so I have to continually be scrolling right and left to see all of the words. What can I do to adjust the display to fit the monitor.

Give this a try to reduce the overall size of your monitor's active screen.

1. Rightclick on the desktop and click Properties and then Settings.
2. Increase the resolution(number) a bit at a time until the screen just fits your monitor space....

Note: Be sure to write down the settings number as they were before you starting monkeying around with the resolutions. Larger numbers makes the screen smaller.

3. If you can't see to click the Apply button, just press Enter to make it change.

Fonts Larger in Windows

XP and Previous Win Versions

1. Rightclick the desktop and click Properties.
2. Click the Appearance tab
3. In the Fonts box, click the down arrow and select Larger or Extra Large
4. Click Apply and OK

Note: this will also increase the size fonts in your email programs for mail received

Note: In Win 7 rightclick desktop and select Personalization. Select Display.
If changing the display size doesn't solve the problem, then click adjust resolution. A lower number will make icons and printer larger.

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Win 7 Font Default in Win Mail

To permanently set the default font face and color for new messages in Windows Live Mail, Windows Mail or Outlook Express:

- Select *Tools / Options...* from the menu in Windows Live Mail, Windows Mail or Outlook Express.
 - In Windows Live Mail, you may have to hold down the *Alt* key to see the menu bar.
- Go to the *Compose* tab.
- Under *Compose Font*, click the *Font Settings...* button next to *Mail:*.
- Choose the desired font and color.
- Click *OK*.

Does The Font Still Look Unnaturally Small?

If you have changed your default font to a larger type but still can barely see what you are typing, it may be your reading font settings' fault. Check in the main Windows Mail or Outlook Express window under *View / Text Size*.

Default Stationery Overrides Default Font

Note: to make sure Windows Live Mail, Windows Mail or Outlook Express is using the font you just specified no [default stationery](#) must be defined or its font settings will be used no matter what you specified under *Font Settings*....

Font Enlarged Easily

1. Hold down the CTRL key and roll the small wheel in the middle of your 3-wheel mouse.
2. Move the wheel away from you for print to be enlarged.
3. Drag the wheel towards you and the print will be reduced in size.

Note: If your mouse doesn't do this, go to control panel, click the Mouse icon and check the mouse settings for your mouse.

Font Changes

Font Changes in MSWORD

You can change the font size temporarily in your word processor by clicking on the displayed font size on the menu bar and clicking the down arrow, then selecting the desired size. But that's slower than the keyboard equivalent. Try it. Hold down the Shift and Ctrl keys, and use < or > to decrease or increase the size. This is especially handy when you wish to enlarge just a few words or lines in a document you're creating.

To change the default font size in MSWORD:

Click Format....Font and select the script, font size,etc. then click OK

To change the font size in AOL:

If you wish to use a different font for a particular email, bring up a new email form, click the down arrow by the present font setting (10 is the AOL default) and select the font you want to use. Write your email using this font. When you open another email form, the font will be back to the default setting.

To change the default font setting on AOL:

Click SETTINGS.....FONT and TEXT.

Select the font you wish to use in all emails by clicking the down arrow by the font size shown (usually 10) and then click on the size to which you wish to change it. Click SAVE. This then will be the default until you change it again. To set it back to the default just click RESET and SAVE.

Change font setting in Outlook Express:

Click Create Mail, address and then click the down arrow in the font size box and select the font you prefer for this email.

To change the default font, Click Tools...Options...click the COMPOSE tab. Make your selections and click SAVE

7 Up Biscuits

- 4 cups Bisquick
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup 7-up...

DID YOU KNOW? Before you read to the end, does anybody know what the main ingredient of WD-40?...

No Cheating WD-40 ~ Who knew!

I had a neighbor who bought a new pickup. I got up very early one Sunday

morning and saw that someone had spray painted red all around the sides of this beige truck (for some unknown reason). I went over, woke him up, and told him the bad news. He was very upset and was trying to figure out what to do.... Probably nothing until Monday morning, since nothing was open. Another neighbor came out and told him to get his WD-40 and clean it off. It removed the unwanted paint beautifully and did not harm his paint job that was on the truck. I was impressed!

"Water Displacement #40".

The product began from a search for a rust preventative solvent and degreaser to protect missile parts.

WD-40 was created in 1953, by three technicians at the San Diego Rocket Chemical Company. Its name comes from the project that was to find a 'Water Displacement' Compound. They were finally successful for a formulation, with their fortieth attempt, thus WD-40. The 'Convair Company' bought it in bulk to protect their atlas missile parts. Ken East (one of the original founders) says there is nothing in WD-40 that would hurt you. When you read the 'shower door' part, try it. It's the first thing that has ever cleaned that spotty shower door.

If yours is plastic, it works just as well as on glass. It's a miracle! Then try it on your stovetop. It's now shinier than it's ever been. You'll be amazed.

WD-40 Uses:

1. Protects silver from tarnishing.
2. Removes road tar and grime from cars.
3. Cleans and lubricates guitar strings.
4. Gives floor that 'just-waxed' sheen without making them slippery.
