New scam - be careful

READ THIS ONE CAREFULLY!!!

This scam is very clever. Be very careful out there! One could easily fall for this -

beware of people bearing gifts

Wednesday a week ago, I had a phone call from someone who said that he was from some outfit called: "Express Couriers" asking if I was going to be home because there was a package for me, and the caller said that the delivery would arrive at my home in roughly an hour. And sure enough, about an hour later, a uniformed delivery man turned up with a beautiful basket of flowers and wine.

I was very surprised since it did not involve any special occasion or holiday, and I certainly didn't expect anything like it. Intrigued about who would send me such a gift, I inquired as to who the sender is. The deliveryman's reply was, he was only delivering the gift package, but allegedly a card was being sent separately; (the card has never arrived!). There was also a consignment note with the gift.

He then went on to explain that because the gift contained alcohol, there was a \$3.50 "delivery charge" as proof that he had actually delivered the package to an adult, and not just left it on the

doorstep where it could be stolen or taken by anyone.

This sounded logical and I offered to pay him cash. He then said that the company required the payment to be by credit or debit card only so that everything is properly accounted for.

My husband, who by this time was standing beside me, pulled his wallet out of his pocket with the credit/debit card, and 'John', the "delivery man", asked my husband to swipe the card on the small mobile card machine which had a small screen and keypad where Frank was also asked to enter the card's PIN and security number. A receipt was printed out and given to us.

To our horrible surprise, between Thursday and the following Monday, \$4,000 had been charged/withdrawn from our credit/debit account at various ATM machines.

It appeared that somehow the "mobile credit card machine" which the deliveryman carried now had all the info necessary to create a "dummy" card with all our card details after my husband swiped our card and entered the requested PIN and security number.

Upon finding out about the illegal transactions on our card, we immediately notified the bank which issued us the card, and our credit/debit account was closed.

We also personally went to the Police, where it was confirmed that it is definitely a scam because several households had been similarly hit.

WARNING: Be wary of accepting any "surprise gift or package", which you neither expected nor personally ordered, especially if it involves any kind of payment as a condition of receiving the gift or package. Also, never accept anything if you do not personally know or there is no proper identification of who the sender is.

Above all, the only time you should give out any personal credit/debit card information is when you yourself initiated the purchase or transaction!

Blue Screen of Death

A sudden blue screen popping up with white writing....is known as the Blue Screen of Death and announces the impending death of your computer unless you find and fix the problem.

What were you doing just before the blue screen appeared? Has it appeared before.

Sometimes something as simple as shutting down completely and restarting the computer will solve the problem. If it doesn't a System Restore can often fix the problem. So, try those two things first.

1. Uninstall that new program.

If your PC crashes or locks up after you install a new program, uninstall it; your computer may return to normal.

2. System Restore

Click Start...all programs...accessories...system tools. Select System Restore and click Restore my computer to a previous date. Select a date that is in BOLD on the calendar.

NOTE: IF you have no idea what a DLL is, you might consider calling someone at this point if you still get the Blue Screen after trying the first two options above.

3. Check the DLLs.

Dynamic link libraries are small programs used--and often shared--by many Windows applications.

Rightclick START...SEARCH or FIND. In the NAMED box type *.dll. In the LOOK IN box click the down arrow and select the C:\ drive. Sort them by selecting *View, Details* and clicking the *Name* column heading.

Search tip: To ease your search, first look for DLLs that cause the most trouble. These are files that begin with the following letters: BWCC, CO, CTL, MFC, MSV, and OLE. Type *MFC*.dll* will find all DLLs that start with MFC.

4. Compare duplicate versions.

Right-click each duplicate file, select *Properties,* and click the Version tab. The date isn't important--it's the version number that is critical. The dll with the latest version number will most likely be found in the Windows system folder or if using XP, the Windows System32 folder.

5. Rename the DLLs.

If you discover a DLL with a lower version number in an application's folder <u>and</u> in the Windows System folder, *don't* delete it. Instead, rightclick the application file and select RENAME to rename the file extension to .d_I. Doing so keeps the old DLL version from

loading and forces the program to look in the System folder for the right DLL. After each DLL renaming ceremony, reboot your PC. If all's well, rename more old DLLs. Shortcut: Download a copy of <u>DLL Checker</u> at <u>Click here: PCWorld.com - DLL Checker</u> a shareware program that finds and highlights duplicate DLLs; it makes renaming DLLs quick and easy.

Win XP

Creating an XP boot disk is much more involved and so I recommend that you have the RECOVERY Disks that came with your computer, or create a set of the disks and keep those in a safe place just in case a crash occurs and you have to reinstall the applications or do a full format and recovery. IF your XP will not power up so you can get to the Recovery disks stored in a partition of your C:\drive, you're going to need something to power up. In most computer's setup that has the XP operating system and stores the Recovery Disks on a partition (D:) of the hard drive, instructions are given for creating Recovery CDs. IF you did not do that and do not have a SET OF RECOVERY DISKS for your computer, then TODAY is the time to create those Recovery CDs...before you need them.

IF you created a set of Recovery Disks but you can't find them, you can recreate the disks if you have an HP or Compaq computer, using the small free download program

How do I install, format, and partition my ATA drive in Windows 95, 98, Me?

Description

ATA hard drive installation instructions for Windows 95, 98, 98 SE, and Millennium edition. Should I use FDISK?

Answer

It is recommended to partition and format your drive using MaxBlast Plus II instead of FDISK. The following step-by-step installation instructions are for both a new (fresh) installation and for adding a secondary drive.

Fresh Install:

1. Install hard drive. Insert the MaxBlast Plus II utility.

2. Start system. Maxblast will detect that a new drive is installed.

3. Choose "Yes" to format the drive.

4. The next window, "Step 6 - Partitioning and Formatting the Maxtor drive", you will see the drive and it will be labeled in red "Partition and Format". Click on "Next"

5. Select "Choose OS" at the next screen. Select the appropriate operating system and choose "Ok".

6. Select "For Advanced Users" and click on "Next".

7. At the next screen partition the drive and select "Next".

8. Stop at "Reboot Now". Remove diskette before restarting computer.

9. If the system boots and a message appears that says "EZ-BIOS: Initializing" follow the onscreen instructions which tells you to hold the CTRL key down. If you miss the step just restart the computer. Choose the option to "Press A to boot from the A:\ drive". When asked enter the Windows System Disk (Start-Up disk) and CD-ROM.

10. If the system boots and the message does not appear enter the Windows System Disk and CD-ROM and restart the system.

11. Select "Start computer with CD-ROM Support".

12. At the A:\ prompt type E: and hit "Enter". At the "E:" type setup and hit "Enter".

Note: "E:" is usually the CD-ROM drive letter. If you have trouble finding the drive letter look for "X = Driver MSCD001" on the screen.

13. Follow on-screen prompts and finish the rest of the installation.

Pharmaceutical companies

have known about this danger for years, we unfortunately, did not.

I urge you to review the list of medicines with PPA and avoid these medications. All drugs containing **PHENYLPROPANOLAMINE** are dangerous. You may want to try calling the 800 number listed on most drug boxes and inquire about a REFUND. Please read this CAREFULLY. Also, please pass this on to everyone you know. STOP TAKING anything containing this ingredient. It has been linked to increased hemorrhagic stroke (**bleeding in brain**) among women ages 18-49 in the three days after starting use of medication. Problems were not found in men, but the FDA recommended that everyone (even children) seek alternative medicine.

They are asking you to call them at **800-548-3708**; **800-548-3708** with the lot number on the box so they can send you postage for you to send it back to them, and they will also issue you a refund. If you know of anyone else with small children,

PLEASE PASS THIS ON. THIS IS SERIOUS STUFF!

DO PASS ALONG TO ALL ON YOUR MAILING LIST so people are informed. They can then pass it along to their families.

I met Shifty in the Philadelphia airport several years ago. I didn't

at the right gate, and noticed the "Screaming Eagle," the symbol of the 101st Airborne, on his hat.

Making conversation, I asked him if he'd been in the 101st Airborne

101st. I thanked him for his service, then asked him when he served,

and how many jumps he made.

Quietly and humbly, he said "Well, I guess I signed up in 1941 or so,

make an old man very happy." His eyes were filling up as he said it.

And mine are brimming up now as I write this.

Shifty died on Jan. 17, 2012 after fighting cancer.

No big event in Staples Center.

No wall-to-wall, back-to-back 24x7 news coverage.

No weeping fans on television.

And that's not right!

Let's give Shifty his own memorial service, on line, in our own quiet way.
