Folder Icons or Details XP & Win 7

Rightclick START and click Windows Explore.

If you prefer to see pictures (icons) that represent the subfolders stored in a folder, then you would want to click VIEW and select ICONS.

If you prefer to know more about each folder, then click VIEW and select DETAILS. On the menu bar you will see a little block that has what appears to be tiny icons on it sitting on the menu bar. Click that little block and you'll get the same choices as when clicking VIEW. There are also other choices such as thumbnails, that's icons with a frame. Or you may select List which is just a list of folders and Files with no other info.

Note: Win 7 The tiny VIEW icon is at the right end of the menu bar. Click it and then click the down arrow to select your preference.

Getting Help with Windows 7

The Windows Help and Support contains answers to most questions you have about Win 7. Use it. Below is an example of information about Libraries. Check it out now before you're in a situation where you need an answer ASAP.

1. Click Start and click Help and Support.

2. In the search box type LIBRARIES. Click ENTER.

A list is presented related to Libraries.

Learn by clicking one topic at a time and carefully reading it. For instance,

What is a library?

In some ways, a library is similar to a folder. For example, when you open a library, you'll see one or more files. However, unlike a folder, a library gathers files that are stored in several locations. This is a subtle, but important, difference. Libraries don't actually store your items. They monitor folders that contain your items, and let you access and arrange the items in different ways. For instance, if you have music files in folders on your hard disk and on an external drive, you can access all of your music files at once using the Music library.

How do I create or change a library?

Windows has four default libraries: Documents, Music, Pictures, and Videos.

To create a new library

Click the Start button, click your user name (which opens your [personal folder](#)), and then, in the left pane, click Libraries.

1. In Libraries, on the [toolbar](#), click New library.
2. Type a name for the library, and then press Enter.

To change a library

Include or remove a folder.

Change the default save location

Change the type of file a library is optimized for

What happens if I delete a library or the items in a library?

If you delete a library, the library itself is moved to the Recycle Bin. The files and folders that were accessible in the library are stored elsewhere and therefore aren't deleted. If you accidentally delete one of the four default libraries (Documents, Music, Pictures, or Videos), you can restore it to its original state in the [navigation pane](#) by right-clicking Libraries and then clicking Restore default libraries.

If you delete files or folders from within a library, they are also deleted from their original locations. If you want to remove an item from a library but not delete it from the location it's stored in, you should remove the folder containing the item. For more information, see [Include folders in a library](#).

Similarly, if you include a folder in a library and then delete the folder from its original location, the folder is no longer accessible in the library.

Why can't I search or arrange files from a folder that I recently included in a library?

If a folder from a non-indexed location (such as an external hard drive or a network) was recently included in a library and it contains a large number of files, it might take some time for the library to add those files to the [index](#). During the indexing process, searches and file arrangements might appear incomplete. For more information about indexing, see [Improve Windows searches using the index: frequently asked questions](#).

What types of locations are supported in libraries?

You can include folders in a library from many different [locations](#), such as your computer's C drive, an external hard drive, or a network.

3. On the Windows Help and Support tool bar click the Browse Help icon(looks like a book). The contents of the HELP file appears, organized by category.

4. Click Files, Folders and Libraries. The topics in that category are listed along with subcategories.

5. Click the Working with Libraries topic. The topic is displayed.

Note: Clicking a **green** word or phrase displays it's definition. Click away from the definition box to close it.

6. Read the topic. Click **BACK** one or more tims to return to Files, Folders and Libraries category.

7.Click the Creating, opening and saving category, and then click the **SAVE A File** topic. The title of each of the topic's subtopics is shown in bold text and preceded by an arrow.

8. At the top of the topic, click SHOW ALL. The two subtopics expand to display hidden information. You can **PRINT** the displayed topic by clicking the **PRINT** button on the toolbar. Subtopics will be printed only if they are displayed.

9. On the toolbar click ASK. Other ways to get help will be displayed.

10. Click the X on the tool bar to CLOSE.

Libraries, Folders and Files in Win 7

You can access your files and folders and organize them in different ways.

The Documents Library - Here organize your wordprocessing documents, spreadsheets, presentations and other text related files. By default text related documents that are moved, copied or stored are stored in the My Documents Folder.

The Pictures Library - Here organize your pictures whether from you camera, scanner or email. By default files that you move, copy or save to the Pictures Library is stored in the My Pictures Folder.

Music Library - Organize and arrange your digital music such as those downloaded from the internet, copied from a CD or sent to you attached to an email. By default files that you move, copy or save to the Music Library are stored in the My Music Folder.

Videos Library - Organize and arrange video clips from your camera, your camcorder or that you downloaded from the internet. By default, files that you move, copy or save to the Videos Library are stored in the My Video Library.

Create a new Library in Win 7

- 1. Click the START button, click user name, and click libraries in the left pane.**
- 2. In Libraries, on the toolbar, click New library.**
- 3. Type a name for the new library and press Enter.**

Remove a folder from a library in Win 7

- 1. On the taskbar, click Windows Explorer button.**
- 2. In the left pane (navigation pane) click the library that you want to remove folders from.**
- 3. In the library pane (above the file list), next to Includes, click Locations.**
- 4. In the box that appears, click the folder you want to remove, click Remove and click OK.**

Viewing and arranging files and folders in Win 7

Just as in previous version of Windows OS, you can use small or large icons, list only names or list details of each file.

Each time you click the left side of the VIEW button on the menu bar it cycles through 5 different views, a) Large icons b) List c) Details and d) Content. IF you click the arrow on the right side of the VIEW button you'll have more options.

Finding files in Win 7

At the top of every window is a Search box. Use this box to locate any file. Just open the box and start typing info about the file.

Copying and moving files and folders in Win 7

1. Open the folder where the file or folder that you wish to move is located.
2. Open the folder where you wish to place the file in a second window .
3. Place these windows on the desktop so they are side by side.
4. Now drag the file or folder from the first folder over to the folder in the second window.

Deleting Files in Win 7

Open the Library or folder in which the file resides.

Select the file and press Delete on the keyboard. The file will be sent to the recycle bin.

Opening Files in Win 7

To open most files, simply doubleclick that file. However, if this is a picture file and you wish to edit that picture, rightclick the file and select Open With to open it in a photo program. Otherwise the picture will open but you won't be able to change it.

Classic Start for Win 8

Classic Shell

Version 3.6.5 – general release

Classic Shell adds some missing features to Windows Vista, Windows 7 and Windows 8 - like a classic start menu, start button, a toolbar for Windows Explorer and others.

Classic Start Menu

Classic Start Menu is a clone of the start menu from Windows 2000, XP and Vista that sadly is gone missing in Windows 7. It has a variety of advanced features:

- Drag and drop to let you organize your applications
- Options to show Favorites, expand Control Panel, etc
- Shows recently used documents. The number of documents to display is customizable
- Translated in 35 languages, including Right-to-left support for Arabic and Hebrew
- Does not disable the original start menu in Windows. You can access it by Shift+Click on the start button
- Right-click on an item in the menu to delete, rename, sort, or perform other tasks
- The search box helps you find your programs without getting in the way of your keyboard shortcuts
- Supports jumplists for easy access to recent documents and common tasks
- Available for 32 and 64-bit operating systems
- Has support for skins, including additional 3rd party skins. Make your own!
- Fully customizable in both looks and functionality
- Support for Microsoft's Active Accessibility
- Converts the "All Programs" button in the Windows menu into a cascading menu (Vista and Windows 7)
- Implements a customizable start button (Windows 7 and 8)
- Can show, search and launch Windows Store apps (Windows 8)

Classic Explorer

Classic Explorer is a plugin for Windows Explorer that:

- Adds a toolbar to Explorer for some common operations (Go to parent folder, Cut, Copy, Paste, Delete, Properties, Email). The toolbar is fully customizable
- Replaces the copy UI in Vista and Windows 7 with the more user-friendly "classic" version similar to Windows XP
- Handles Alt+Enter in the folder panel of Windows Explorer and shows the properties of the selected folder
- Has options for customizing the folder panel to look more like the Windows XP version or to not fade the expand buttons
- Can show the free disk space and the total size of the selected files in the status bar
- Can disable the breadcrumbs in the address bar
- Fixes a long list of features that are broken in Windows 7 – missing icon overlay for shared folders, the jumping folders in the navigation pane, missing sorting headers in list view, and more

Classic IE9

Classic IE9 is a plugin for Internet Explorer 9 and 10 that:

- Adds a caption to the title bar so you can see the full title of the page
- Shows the security zone in the status bar
- Shows the loading progress in the status bar

Installation instructions

The toolbar for Windows Explorer will not show up automatically after installation. You have to do a few things before you can use it:

- 1) Open a new Windows Explorer window (Win key+E)
- 2) Go to the View menu and select Toolbars -> "Classic Explorer Bar" to show the toolbar.
- 3) If that option is not available (you only see "Lock the Toolbars") you may have to enable the plugin from Internet Explorer. Run IE, right click on its toolbar and select "Classic Explorer Bar". It will ask you if you want to enable this add-on. Select "Enable", then do steps 1 and 2 again.
- 4) If that doesn't work, try going to Tools -> Manage addons in Internet Explorer. Locate the addons "Classic Explorer Bar" and "ExplorerBHO Class" and make sure they are enabled.
- 5) If even then you don't see the toolbar, maybe the browser extensions are disabled on your system. This is usually the default for servers. Open the "Internet Options", go to the "Advanced" tab, and check the option "Enable third-party browser extensions".

It goes without saying (*but I'll say it anyway!*) that you have to turn on the status bar from the View menu if you want to see the file sizes.

The caption in Internet Explorer may not show up automatically after installation. You may get a prompt to enable the ClassicIE9BHO plugin. If you get the prompt, select "Enable". If you don't get a prompt, go to Tools -> Manage addons and make sure the addon "ClassicIE9BHO" is enabled. After that restart Internet Explorer.

Uninstallation

To uninstall **Classic Shell** follow these steps:

- 1) Open a new Windows Explorer window
- 2) Make sure the toolbar is hidden (if you uninstall while the toolbar is visible, the menu bar in Explorer will get stuck in the visible state and you won't be able to hide it)
- 3) Close all Windows Explorer windows
- 4) Open **Control Panel -> Programs and Features** and double-click on **Classic Shell**. Then follow the instructions. You may have to restart Windows to complete the process.

- 5) If you installed any additional skins for the start menu you will have to delete them manually

If you missed step 2 and now you can't hide the menu bar in Explorer, install Classic Shell again, and follow the uninstall steps carefully.

If you upgrade from version 2.8.3 or older

The new settings system will not preserve any of your old settings. Neither the ones done in the Settings dialog, nor the ones in the ini files.

The new system is designed to be forward-compatible, so any future version will be able to preserve your settings during upgrade.

Computer Slow Down

IF your computer has slowed down....do a really good monthly maintenance and see if it picks up speed. Usually a slow down is due to one of two things,

1. Too many files that need to be deleted such as temporary internet files, temp files, history files, old email files, etc...even old System Restore Points.
2. A program that's been installed that is a resource(RAM) guzzler.

Doubleclick My Computer and rightclick the C: drive.

1. Click Disk Cleanup to take care of #1 above
2. Then click Tools and click Error checking. You'll need to restart your computer to do this and it will take quite a bit of time if you have a large hard drive...so let it run while you're doing something else. Click Error checking and restart your computer to allow it to do the program.
2. Next do defrag.
3. If no difference in speed after doing the above, check for that "program".
 - a. Click Start...Run and type in msconfig then click OK
 - b. Click the LOAD THESE ITEMS AT STARTUP to remove the check.
 - c. Click Apply and Ok and restart your computer....if it is speedier now, you can be pretty sure the problem is a particular program that is starting each time you start your computer. Problem is, it isn't quick and easy to isolate the problem. So, do this when you have several hours to spare. (if you can't do it now, go back to msconfig and put the check back into Load these Items.....) click Apply and Ok and restart as you MUST have your anti-virus program and firewall and spyware programs running if you plan to get online at all.
4. Isolate problem program:
 - a. Click Start...Run and type in msconfig then click OK
 - b. Place a check in SELECTIVE rather than Normal
 - c. Click the Startup tab.
 - d. Uncheck half the boxes. Make a note the last box unchecked so you'll know where to start next. Click Apply and Ok and restart your computer. Is it speedier? IF yes, then you know the program is one of those you unchecked. Go back and check back half of those unchecked and see if it's still speedier. IF yes, you know it's one of those boxes still unchecked.
 - e. You must continue unchecking and checking boxes until you find the particular program box that causes the slow-down. Once that is determined, you must decide if you can do without that program being in STARTUP or even if you can uninstall that program entirely.

Items that Must be in Startup:

Anti-virus program

Anti-spyware program

Firewall, if using a firewall

Synotic Mouse, if you're using the built in mouse on a laptop

Any other program that if it is not in startup causes problems in running your computer. You will know this when you restart and begin using the computer if you get an error message relating to a particular program that it is looking for that has been unchecked in Startup.

Another possible way to find the slowdown culprit

Assuming you're running Windows XP:

1. Rightclick the taskbar at the bottom of your screen, and select Task Manager
2. The task manager has 5 tabs: Application, Processes, Performance, Networking and Users. Click the Processes tab. It has 4 columns. Image Name, User Name, CPU and Mem Usage. Each column can be sorted ascending or descending by clicking the column title.
3. Open the task manager, select Processes and the CPU column until you experience one of these slowdowns. Sort by the CPU column and note which image name which is using most of the CPU processing.
4. Click that image name and select END PROCESS.
5. Now, go to www.google.com and enter the image name of the process to learn which program it is associated with.
6. Remove this program from your STARTUP to prevent it from starting every time you start your computer.

NOTE: if it is your anti-virus or firewall, you may consider changing the settings, but you do not want to remove these two programs from STARTUP. Might be better to consider using a program that is less hoggish in it's demands on your processor.

Note: System Idle Process is not a bad process, don't try and remove this process.

Pork Chops in Savory Mushroom Cream Sauce

4 boneless pork loin chops (1/2 inch thick)

1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

... 4 teaspoons canola or olive oil

1 medium onion, cut into thin wedges

1 package sliced fresh mushrooms (2 cups)

1/2 cup Progresso® chicken broth (from 32-oz carton)

4 teaspoons cornstarch

1 container (6 oz) Yoplait® Greek Fat Free plain yogurt
4 cups hot cooked rice or pasta

Sprinkle both sides of pork chops with seasoned salt and pepper. Heat 2 teaspoons of the oil in 10-inch nonstick skillet over medium-high heat until hot. Add pork chops; cook about 4 minutes on each side or until golden brown. Remove pork chops from skillet; set aside.

In same skillet, heat remaining 2 teaspoons oil over medium heat. Add onion and mushrooms; cook 3 minutes, stirring frequently.

In measuring cup, mix chicken broth and cornstarch; add to skillet. Heat to boiling. Return pork chops to skillet; spoon some of the sauce over pork. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for about 30 minutes, stirring occasionally, until pork is no longer pink in center.

Stir in yogurt until well blended; cook over low heat just until heated through. Serve with rice or pasta.
